With displays, memorabilia, and architectural nods to its original character, the lobby will serve as a vibrant

reminder of Troy's artistic past while welcoming residents into a new era of civic engagement. Part of this is our plan to preserve what we can of the original stage curtain, which dates back to the early 1920's – and incorporate it as a featured element of the historic lobby. Due to its age and delicate condition, full restoration may not be possible, but our goal is to thoughtfully conserve key portions that reflect the theater's legacy. As part of the transformation, we plan to also preserve some of the original seating, even as we repurpose the space for the future. The majority of the seating area will be reimagined to house our new Assembly Hall - a fitting blend of historic preservation and civic progress. This will offer a truly unique experience by incorporating large interior windows that allow visitors to view the preserved elements of the historic theater from within the Assembly space. This thoughtful design creates a dynamic connection between the past and present, letting the community witness the character of the original architecture while conducting the business of the city. It's a powerful visual reminder that while we move Troy forward, we're doing so with deep respect for the legacy that built it.

As we embark on this monumental change, I must express my deepest gratitude to those who have made this possible. First and foremost, I want to thank our Deputy Mayor and one of my best friends, Seamus Donnelly, who has been so crucial in getting this across the finish line.
